Guidelines

The Forum for Ethiopian Scholars and Professionals is pleased to announce that the 10th conference will be held virtually. These guidelines are intended for all conference participants (i.e. speakers, session chairs, master of ceremony and the general online audience) to **establish minimum standards and expectations** to ensure a productive and successful conference and colloquia. **The conference will be transmitted live.** Hence the standards and etiquettes required for formal online meetings will be applied.

Guidelines for Session Chairs

Session chairs and presenters should connect to the conference using a **Private ZOOM link** that will be sent by Abbay Media and FESP. Please **do not** share the link with another person. All speakers must test their audio and video and ensure that they can share their Power Point and other material that they want to use for their presentation. **Please ensure that your video is of television quality** (good lighting, uncluttered background & business or traditional attire).

One of the most important responsibilities of session chairs is ensuring that sessions and presentations start and finish on time, without any exception. We request session chairs to pay attention to the following:

- (1) Please ensure that your connection is working. Allow enough time for the technicians to get you connected. **Try to be available early** (Abbay Media will be available one hour before the start of the conference to check your settings).
- (2) Introduce all speakers at the beginning of the session. Please no long vita. It should not take more than one minute to introduce a speaker.
- (3) Do not try to answer questions that may be directed to the speakers. Monitor the chat line (if it is open) and watch the feedback from Facebook participants which will be forwarded to you by Abbay Media technicians. Select sensible questions and direct the questions to the speakers. Ignore all malicious comments and unidentified communications.
- (4) Promote collegiality and respectfulness during Q & A, and at all times.



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- (5) Please put your cellphone on silent mode and read text messages and reminders that may come from the conference committee and Abbay Media technicians.
- (6) Alert presenters five minutes and one minute before the end of their time, and you should stop the speaker on time.
- (7) Do not paraphrase what a speaker or the speakers have said and refrain from giving your opinion or talking about your research/experience or your organization. You might want to give additional references to the audience for research.
- (8) Please note the difference between a “Session Chair” and a “Moderator”. A session chair is “responsible for clearly communicating expectations and logistical information about the session” while a moderator is “responsible for guiding the direction and flow of discussion”. You are a session chair and not a moderator.

Guidelines for a Master of Ceremony (MC)

- (1) The Master of Ceremony (MC) is the host of the Session (colloquium on a specific theme). He/she formally introduces the Session Chair. He/she monitors the agenda and ensures that the event runs smoothly. He communicates with Abbay Media technicians and the Chair of the Conference Committee. The ability to make the audience feel at ease and create a good atmosphere are the primary roles of an MC. He/she should have strong time management skills and may use appropriate sense of humor.
- (2) The Master of ceremony must not make remarks about specific speaker or provide his/her own interpretation of the issues that are being discussed. He/she should refrain from making an opinion as each colloquium is populated by experts in the field.
- (3) He/she shall not use the forum for advertising or interjecting an activity that is not on the schedule, without consulting the conference committee.

Guidelines for Presenters

All presenters are reminded that the purpose of their presentation is to contribute to policy formulation and implementation. Your presentation must end with two/three doable concrete policy proposals. The policy must have been tried and tested and, benefit all Ethiopians. The conference is not a platform for promoting a speaker’s organization or business or unfounded opinion. As such, all presenters are expected to be non-partisan, and should have no conflict of interest, whatsoever. It is not a forum for advocacy, however worthy your cause might be. It is not a forum for rationalizing conflict, sectarianism and separatism.

Presenters are requested to make note of the following:

- (1) Please ensure that your presentation is of high quality, focused and understandable by non-experts in the field, the general public, and policymakers.
- (2) To reach a larger audience please note that the language used in the conference is Amharic. Presenters who are unable to speak the Amharic language may present their work in English. Your power point can be in either Amharic or English.



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- (3) Both qualitative and quantitative research methods are welcome, Avoid anecdotal evidence and case-based generalizations. The forum is not created for canvassing support. Stick to the paper/abstract that has been reviewed.
- (4) To the extent possible, avoid complex mathematical/statistical modelling, technical jargons, abstraction, crude generalizations, and inflammatory, offensive or divisive language..
- (5) Address individuals, political organizations, institutions, governments and social groups using their formal names, ranks, titles, etc. and the way they would like to be called.
- (6) Keep your presentation to 25 minutes and, allow time for questions and answers. Try to get your key messages across as early as possible. If your presentation is longer than the allotted time, you will run the risk of being cut off, without communicating the essence of your paper.
- (7) Always remember that you are taking other speakers' time and disrupting the flow of the conference when you go beyond the time allotted to you.
- (8) Limit your answers to the question(s) directed to you and answer them in two minutes or less.
- (9) Please note that the event will be transmitted live and recorded. It will be available for public viewing for an indefinite period. While the intellectual property rests on the speaker/presenter the copyright to the material belongs to FESP and Abbay Media.
- (10) Important Disclaimer: Neither FESP nor its board members nor the host media take responsibility for what a speaker has said or did not say or for any damages that may arise from the presentation. It is the speaker's sole responsibility to avoid any civil or criminal litigation that might arise from the misuse of the forum.
- (11) Please allow time for technological glitches that might occur. Be patient.

Guidelines for viewers and online participants

The presenters in this conference and colloquia are respected individuals who are engaging in a voluntary public service. They are public intellectuals who share their research works and experience with the general public. They are creating a public good for all. According to the Oxford English Dictionary a public intellectual is "an intellectual who expresses views (especially on popular topics) intended to be accessible to a general audience." It is different from ordinary elite social/political/economic activism. Audience involvement is a crucial part of the conference and the colloquia. We encourage online viewers to participate using the Q & A option. All questions that get sent will be moderated. It is at the sole discretion of the session chair to decide which questions/comments should be answered. Please comply with the following guidelines:-

- (1) Make sure that your question is relevant to the theme of the session.
- (2) State your full name (no pen name), your institutional affiliation, the country where you are, and identify the speaker to whom the question is addressed to.
- (3) As a matter of courtesy, be brief and ask only one question. No long comments will be entertained. Do not send file attachments.
- (4) If you are given the opportunity to ask your question verbally, you should be on video.



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- (5) Address individuals, political organizations, governments, institutions, and social groups using their formal names, ranks, titles, etc. and the way they would like to be called. If you use offensive language or image or desecrate the national flag or symbol, or heritage/religious artifacts that people value, your question will not be aired no matter how important your question or comment may be.

Guidelines for the Media

The FESP has commissioned Abbay Media to market, send Zoom links, host, record and transmit the proceedings of this conference and colloquia “as is”. Each session will be transmitted “as is” and in full. No individual presentation will be separately released. The intellectual property rests on the presenters. The copyrights to the conference belong to FESP and Abbay Media. No part of this conference may be transmitted or be available for public viewing without explicit written permission of FESP and Abbay Media.
